




Department of surgery Radical abdominal trachelectomy

What is a radical abdominal trachelectomy?

A radical trachelectomy is an operation to treat cervical cancer. It may be offered to women who wish to keep their womb (uterus) because they still wish to have children.

Why do I need a radical abdominal trachelectomy?

On a scan your cancer appears to be 2cm or greater in size. Recent research from America has shown that when a cervical cancer is this size, the long term outcomes are better when the operation is performed through a cut in the tummy (abdominally) rather than vaginally.


How will this affect my recovery after surgery?

Your recovery will take a little longer than a vaginal operation. You will be in hospital for approximately 3 - 4 days and it can take 6 - 8 weeks to fully recover.



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Avoid lifting or carrying anything heavy (including children and shopping) for a minimum of 6 weeks, and then only when you feel comfortable. Vacuuming and spring cleaning should also be avoided for at least 6 weeks after the operation.

When can I start to drive again?

We advise you not to drive for at least 6 weeks after your operation. However, this will depend on your individual recovery.
